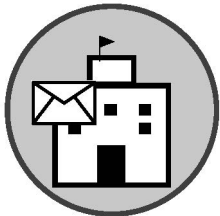

Please note – this year voting is different! This Voter Information Guide contains information for the November 2, 2021 Consolidated General Election. In an effort to reduce the spread of COVID-19 and in accordance with State Law, the Riverside County Registrar of Voters will be deploying a new election model for the upcoming November 2, 2021 Election. This will offer our voters more ways to vote safely. Each eligible registered voter for the November 2, 2021 Election will receive a ballot by mail beginning Monday, October 4, 2021.

Voters can verify their voter registration at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov or register to vote at registertovote.ca.gov.

- Your Vote-By-Mail ballot may be returned at any of our secure Ballot Drop-Off locations that will be available beginning October 4, 2021 or via USPS (no postage required).
- We will be operating Polling Places in Riverside County. You can vote at your assigned polling place on Election Day, November 2, 2021.
- You may track your ballot by registering at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov.
- A list of all Ballot Drop-Off locations and Polling Places is posted at www.voteinfo.net.

The Riverside County Registrar of Voters recommends that voters only use the in-person Polling Places if absolutely necessary, as the generalized use of in-person voting presents risks to public health and safety in light of the COVID-19 pandemic.

MEASURE “G” - CITY OF MORENO VALLEY

ORDINANCE NO. 982

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, SECTION 3.36.020 (RATE) OF CHAPTER 3.36 (SALES AND USE TAX) OF TITLE 3 (REVENUE AND FINANCE) OF THE MORENO VALLEY MUNICIPAL CODE SHALL BE AMENDED TO INCREASE THE RATE OF SALES AND USE TAX BY ONE PERCENT (One Cent)

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. ELECTIONS CODE SECTION 13119 STATEMENT

That the additional one percent increase of the local sales and use tax is estimated to produce approximately \$20 million per year, which may be used to fund general municipal services, and which shall remain in effect unless subsequently repealed by the voters.

Section 2. LOCAL USE OF PROCEEDS

That the additional revenue produced by the additional 1¢ increase of the local sales and use tax may be used for any local general municipal purpose including, but not limited to, maintaining 9-1-1 emergency response times; maintaining robbery and burglary suppression programs; maintaining safe and clean public areas; repairing potholes, local streets and roads; and enhancing recreation and youth programs and facilities within the City of Moreno Valley.

Section 3. ANNUAL INDEPENDENT AUDITS

That the financial records, accounting practices and internal controls related to the collection, deposit and expenditure of the additional revenue produced by the additional one percent increase shall be examined by means of an annual audit conducted by an independent auditor whose services shall be retained by the City through a contract for services as an independent contractor and available to the public for review.

Section 4. ADDITIONAL ONE PERCENT SALES AND USE TAX

That Section 3.36.020 (Rate) of Chapter 3.36 (Sales and Use Tax) of Title 3 (Revenue and Finance) of the Moreno Valley Municipal Code shall be amended to increase the rate of sales and use tax by one percent (one cent) as follows:

Chapter 3.36

SALES AND USE TAX

3.36.010 Short title.

This chapter shall be known as the “uniform local sales and use tax ordinance.”

3.36.020 Rate.

The rate of sales tax and use tax imposed by this chapter shall be two percent.

3.36.030 Purpose.

The city council declares that the ordinance codified in this chapter is adopted to achieve the following, among other, purposes, and directs that the provisions hereof be interpreted in order to accomplish those purposes:

- A. To adopt a sales and use tax ordinance which complies with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.5 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code;
- B. To adopt a sales and use tax ordinance which incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the state of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.5 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code;
- C. To adopt a sales and use tax ordinance which imposes a tax and provides a measure therefor that can be administered and collected by the State Board of Equalization in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and requires the least possible deviation from the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the State Board of Equalization in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes;
- D. To adopt a sales and use tax ordinance which can be administered in a manner that will, to the degree possible consistent with the provisions of Part 1.5 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimize the cost of collecting city sales and use taxes and at the same time minimize the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this chapter.

3.36.040 Contract with state.

Prior to the operative date this city shall contract with the State Board of Equalization to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this sales and use tax ordinance; provided, that if this city shall not have contracted with the State Board of Equalization prior to the operative date, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the operative date shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter following

the execution of such a contract rather than the first day of the first calendar quarter following the adoption of the ordinance codified in this chapter.

3.36.050 Sales tax.

A. For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail a tax is hereby imposed upon all retailers in the city at the rate stated in Section 3.36.020 of the gross receipts of the retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in this city on and after the operative date.

B. Any person subject to a sales tax under this section shall be granted a credit against the payment of tax owed under the section in the amount of sales tax paid, if any, to the community redevelopment agency of the city pursuant to the Moreno Valley redevelopment agency sales and use tax ordinance.

C. Any person subject to a use tax under this section shall be granted a credit against the payment of tax owed under the section in the amount of use tax paid, if any, to the community redevelopment agency of the city pursuant to the Moreno Valley redevelopment agency sales and use tax ordinance.

3.36.060 Place of sale.

For the purposes of this chapter, all retail sales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the state or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the State Board of Equalization.

3.36.070 Use tax.

An excise tax is imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in this city of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the operative date for storage, use or other consumption in this city at the rate stated in Section 3.36.020 of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

3.36.080 Adoption of provisions of state law.

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.5 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are adopted and made a part of this chapter as though fully set forth herein.

3.36.090 Limitations on adoption of state law.

In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, wherever the state of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of this city shall be substituted therefor. The substitution, however, shall not be made when the word "State" is used as part of the title of the State Controller, the State Treasurer, the State Board of Control, the State Board of Equalization, the State Treasury, or the Constitution of the state of California; the substitution shall not be made when the result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against the city, or any agency thereof rather than by or against the State Board of Equalization, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this chapter; the substitution shall not be made in those sections, including, but not necessarily limited to, sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the state of California, where the result of the substitution would be to provide an exemption from this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use or other consumption remain subject to tax by the state under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, or to impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not be subject to tax by the state under the provisions of that Code; the substitution shall not be made in Sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797 or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code; and the substitution shall not be made for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in Section 6203 or in the definition of that phrase in Section 6203.

3.36.100 Permit not required.

If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under Section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional seller's permit shall not be required by this chapter.

3.36.110 Exclusions and exemptions.

A. The amount subject to tax shall not include any sales or use tax imposed by the state of California upon a retailer or consumer.

B. The storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property, the gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to tax under a sales and use tax ordinance enacted in accordance with Part 1.5 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code by any city and county, county, or city in this state shall be exempt from the tax due under this ordinance.

C. There are exempted from the computation of the amount of the sales tax the gross receipts from the sale of tangible personal property to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the city in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this state, the United States, or any foreign government.

D. In addition to the exemptions provided in Sections 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code the storage, use, or other consumption of tangible personal property purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this state, the United States, or any foreign government is exempted from the use tax.

3.36.120 Amendments.

All subsequent amendments of the Revenue and Taxation Code which relate to the sales and use tax and which are not inconsistent with Part 1.5 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code shall automatically become a part of this chapter.

3.36.130 Enjoining collection forbidden.

No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action or proceeding in any court against the state or this city, or against any officer of the state or this city, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this chapter, or Part 1.5 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.

3.36.140 Violations—Penalties.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or by imprisonment for a period of not more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. SEVERABILITY

That should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence, or word of this ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any final court action in a court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this ordinance as hereby adopted shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 6. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING PROVISIONS

That all the provisions of the Municipal Code as heretofore adopted by the City of Moreno Valley that conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 7. AMENDMENTS

That Section 3.36.020 (Rate) of Chapter 3.36 (Sales and Use Tax) of Title 3 (Revenue and Finance) of the Moreno Valley Municipal Code shall not be subsequently amended unless approved by the voters, but the remaining provisions of Chapter 3.36 (Sales and Use Tax) may be amended by the city council unless otherwise provided by applicable law.

Section 8. CERTIFICATION

That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published according to law.

Section 9. OPERATIVE DATE OF ADDITIONAL ONE PERCENT SALES AND USE TAX

That the operative date of the additional one percent sales and use tax shall be April 1, 2022, which is the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after adoption of this ordinance by the voters on November 2, 2021.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE “G”

On August 3, 2021, the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley unanimously declared the continued existence of a fiscal emergency and adopted a resolution placing the Local Moreno Valley Essential Services Measure, a one-cent local general sales tax measure, on the ballot for voter consideration at the November 2, 2021 Election. Approval of the measure will require a vote of at least 50% plus 1 of the voters voting in the election. If approved, the one-cent sales tax will take effect on April 1, 2022, and it will remain in effect unless repealed by the voters. It will also be subject to annual audits by an independent auditor.

The one-cent sales tax will require that for every one dollar spent on the purchase of a taxable item in the City of Moreno Valley, an additional penny will have to be paid. City staff has estimated that the one-cent sales tax will produce approximately \$20 million per year. The revenue generated by the proposed one-cent sales tax will be deposited in the City's General Fund to fund general municipal services, including but not limited to the following:

- To maintain 9-1-1 emergency response times;
- To fund robbery/burglary prevention programs;
- To maintain and improve neighborhood police patrols;
- To maintain and improve fire engine service levels;
- To address homelessness issues;
- To fund the repair of potholes, streets and sidewalks;
- To maintain public areas, such as public parks, in a safe and clean manner;
- To fund programs to help retain local businesses;
- To maintain and enhance senior services;
- To maintain and enhance youth and afterschool programs; and
- To fund other general municipal services.

Under the current state of the law, this revenue cannot be taken away or redirected by the State.

A “Yes” vote is to approve the one-cent sales tax.

A “No” vote is to reject the one-cent sales tax.

California Motor Voter

The California Motor Voter program is making registering to vote at the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) more convenient and secure. All eligible individuals completing driver license or ID card or change of address transactions at the DMV will be registered to vote with the California Secretary of State unless they "opt out" of automatic voter registration.

The California Motor Voter program applies to Californians who are 18 years or older and meet the following criteria:

- A United States citizen and a resident of California.
- Not currently in state or federal prison for the conviction of a felony.
- Not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court.

Note: Voter pre-registration is available for those 16 and 17 years of age. Their voter registration will become active automatically when they turn 18.

Before visiting a DMV field office, we recommend making an appointment. Visit <https://www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/dmv/detail/portal/foa/welcome> to get started. You can also use DMV online services (<https://www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/dmv/dmv-online/>) to renew your driver license or ID card or change your address.

If you indicate you're eligible to vote, once you complete your driver license or state ID renewal form transaction online, by mail or in person at the DMV, your voter information is then transmitted securely and electronically to the California Secretary of State.

Please note that drivers with an AB 60 driver's license are not eligible to participate in the California Motor Voter program and are not eligible to vote.

-  At any voting location or at the Riverside County elections office.

VOTER BILL *of* RIGHTS



★ YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS ★

1. **The right to vote if you are a registered voter.** You are eligible to vote if you are:

- ★ a U.S. citizen living in California
- ★ at least 18 years old
- ★ registered where you currently live
- ★ Not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony, and
- ★ not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court

2. **The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list.**

You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.

3. **The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.**

4. **The right to cast a secret ballot** without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.

5. **The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake**, if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:

Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot,
Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place, or
Vote using a provisional ballot.

6. **The right to get help casting your ballot** from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.

7. **The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place** in California.

8. **The right to get election materials in a language other than English** if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.

9. **The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures** and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.

10. **The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity** to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.

SPECIAL NOTICE

- Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on the day indicated in the posted county Voter Information Guide.
- Specific instructions on how to vote, including how to cast a provisional ballot, can be obtained from a poll worker or by reading the information mailed to you by your local elections official.
- If you are a newly registered voter, you may be asked to provide appropriate identification or other documentation according to federal law. But please note that every individual has the right to cast a provisional ballot even if he or she does not provide the documentation.
- It is against the law to represent yourself as being eligible to vote unless you meet all of the requirements to vote under federal and state law.
- It is against the law to tamper with voting equipment.

Tips for California's Military and Overseas Voters

Taking part in elections is more convenient than ever for Californians serving in the military or living outside the United States. It begins when you register to vote as a military or overseas voter and receive election materials by mail, fax, or email.

- **Start early.** California's county elections officials begin sending ballots to military and overseas voters 60 days before Election Day. Fill out a voter registration application early at RegisterToVote.ca.gov to ensure that you receive your voting materials in time.
- **Know your options.** When registering to vote as a military or overseas voter, you can choose to have your ballot mailed, faxed, or emailed to you. You may return your voted ballot to your county elections official by mail or, in certain circumstances, by fax. If you meet the requirements to return your ballot by fax, you must also fax the Oath of Voter form (available from your county elections official) waiving your right to a confidential ballot.
- **Stay in touch.** Once you register as a military or overseas voter, you will continue to receive a ballot and election materials from your county elections official before each election. We encourage you to update your registration each year, if needed; however, you *must* re-register to vote if you change your address, your name, or your political party preference, or if you do not participate in four consecutive statewide general elections. Visit www.sos.ca.gov/elections/voter-registration/military-overseas-voters/ for more election resources designed especially for you.

Dates to remember:

October 18: last day to register to vote and request your ballot

October 26: last day to update or change how you want to receive your ballot

November 2: Election Day. Mailed ballots must be postmarked on or before Election Day **and** received by your county elections office no later than November 9. Faxed ballots must be delivered to your county elections office by close of polls, no later than 8:00 p.m. Pacific Standard Time, on Election Day.

Gain hands-on experience and take part in the single most important day in our democracy—Election Day!

Who can be a poll worker?

To serve as a poll worker you must be:

- ✓ A U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident; or
- ✓ An eligible high school student

What does a poll worker do?

- ✓ Sets up and closes a polling place
- ✓ Helps voters understand their rights
- ✓ Protects ballots and voting equipment

Why be a poll worker?

- ✓ Get involved and assist voters
- ✓ Contribute to your community and meet your neighbors
- ✓ Earn extra money

High School Poll Workers

To serve as a high school poll worker, a student must:

- ✓ Be a U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident
- ✓ Be at least 16 years old on Election Day
- ✓ Attend a public or private high school
- ✓ Have at least a 2.5 grade point average
- ✓ Get permission from your parents and school
- ✓ Attend a training session

Check Your Voter Status Online



Visit the Secretary of State's My Voter Status page at VoterStatus.sos.ca.gov, where you can check your voter status, find your polling place, and much more.

Use **My Voter Status** to:

- See if you are registered to vote
- Check your political party preference
- Find your polling place
- Find upcoming elections in your area
- Receive your Voter Information Guide (VIG) by email before each statewide election (see below for more information on opting-out of the VIG)
- Check the status of your vote-by-mail ballot or provisional ballot

To check your voter status you will need some personal information like first name, last name, California driver license or identification card number, social security number (last 4 numbers), and date of birth.

You can use the My Voter Status tool to opt out of receiving the state VIG. However, if another registered voter in your household requests to get it by mail, a state VIG will still be mailed to your address. If you have opted out and do not receive the state VIG in the mail, information on statewide candidates and ballot measures will still be available at the VIG website (<http://voterguide.sos.ca.gov/>) before each statewide election.

Go to VoterStatus.sos.ca.gov to get started.

Pre-register at sixteen. Vote at eighteen.

Online Pre-registration is now available for eligible 16 and 17 year olds at RegisterToVote.ca.gov or via the paper voter registration form. California youth who Pre-register to vote will have their registration become active once they turn 18 years old.

Pre-register in 4 easy steps:

1. Visit www.RegisterToVote.ca.gov
2. Click the "Pre-register to Vote" button
3. Become automatically registered on your 18th birthday
4. Cast your ballot on Election Day!

What is Pre-registration?

If you are 16 or 17 years old and meet all other voter eligibility requirements, you can Pre-register to vote at RegisterToVote.ca.gov.

Simply complete the online Pre-registration application and on your 18th birthday, you will automatically be registered to vote.

Provisional voting

If your name is not on the voter list at your polling place, you have the right to vote a provisional ballot.

What is a provisional ballot?

A provisional ballot is a regular ballot that is placed in a special envelope prior to being put in the ballot box.

Who casts a provisional ballot?

Provisional ballots are ballots cast by voters who believe they are registered to vote even though their names are not on the official voter registration list at the polling place.

Vote by mail voters may need to cast provisional ballots if the voter wants to vote in person at a polling place, but did not receive their ballot or does not have their ballot with them.

Will my provisional ballot be counted?

Your provisional ballot will be counted after elections officials have confirmed that you are registered to vote in that county and you did not already vote in that election.

You may vote a provisional ballot at any polling place in the county in which you are registered to vote, however, only the elections contests you are eligible to vote for will be counted.

How can you check the status of your provisional ballot?



You can check the status of your provisional ballot at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov

Alternatively, every voter who casts a provisional ballot has the right to find out from their county elections official if the ballot was counted and, if not, the reason why it was not counted.

ACCOMMODATIONS FOR VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES

A "YES" or "NO" printed under the disabled symbol/arrow on the back cover of this guide indicates whether or not your nearest polling place is accessible to physically disabled voters. Please be advised of the following alternate ways you may cast your ballot.

- **By Mail** - Your ballot must be received at the Registrar of Voters office no later than 8:00 p.m. on Election Day or be postmarked on or before Election Day and received no later than seven days after Election Day to be counted. You may request a Vote-by-Mail ballot for all future Elections. Simply contact the Registrar of Voters office by calling (951) 486-7200, (800) 773-VOTE (8683), California Relay Service (Dial 711).
- **Early Voting** - You may vote at the Registrar of Voters office located at 2720 Gateway Drive, Riverside, CA 92507, October 4 - November 1 (excluding Holidays), Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; and Election Day, November 2, 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Please visit our website at www.voteinfo.net for additional early voting locations and information.
- **Remote Accessible Vote by Mail Ballot (RAVBM)** - Accessible Vote-by-Mail provides an accessible option for voters to mark their ballots privately and independently. To complete a RAVBM ballot visit www.voteinfo.net. Your completed ballot and signed Oath of the Voter must be returned to the Registrar of Voters office no later than 8:00 p.m. on Election Day or be postmarked on or before Election Day and received no later than seven days after Election Day to be counted.
- **Curbside Voting on Election Day** - If you are unable to enter the location due to a physical disability, you may request Curbside Voting at any polling place. Curbside Voting doorbells may be available at some polling places. If you require Curbside Voting assistance you may call (877) 663-9906 before going to a polling place and/or when you arrive at the facility. An Election Officer will be contacted prior to your arrival to meet you at the curb.
