

Election Day is just around the corner on November 5, 2024! Your County Voter Information Guide is here, providing essential details for voting, including instructions on marking your ballot, candidate information, a sample ballot, and other important election details to review before you vote. Tip: You can mark your sample ballot and bring it with you to any Vote Center for easy reference.

Starting October 7, 2024, ballots will be mailed to all active registered voters. You can check your registration at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov or register at registertovote.ca.gov.

Vote at any vote center. We have more days and more ways to cast your ballot!

- Returning Your Ballot: You may drop off your ballot at any secure ballot Drop-Off Location starting October 7, 2024, or mail your ballot via USPS (no postage needed).
- Receiving Your Ballot: Your ballot must be received by the Registrar of Voters by Election Day or postmarked on Election Day and received within seven days (November 12, 2024).
- Tracking Your Ballot: Register at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov.

Early Voting: Vote in person at the Registrar of Voters office starting October 7, 2024, (excluding holidays) 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Hours change on October 26 - 27, and November 2 - 3 to 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. For a list of locations and hours, visit voteinfo.net.

Election Day: All Vote Centers, including the Registrar of Voters office, will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

The voter registration deadline is October 21, 2024. For more information or questions, call us at (951) 486-7200.

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Previously known as partisan offices, voter-nominated offices include state legislative offices, United States congressional offices, and state constitutional offices.

In both the open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), a general election still must be held.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices may still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate may only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for United States President, county central committee, or local offices.

California law requires the following information to be printed in this guide.

Party-Nominated/Partisan Offices

Political parties may formally nominate candidates for party-nominated/partisan offices at the primary election. A nominated candidate will represent that party as its official candidate for the specific office at the general election and the ballot will reflect an official designation. The top vote-getter for each party at the primary election moves on to the general election. Parties also elect officers of county central committees at the primary election.

A voter can only vote in the primary election of the political party he or she has disclosed a preference for upon registering to vote. However, a political party may allow a person who has declined to disclose a party preference to vote in that party's primary election.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have his or her qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In the county voter information guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, if they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.





FULL TEXT BALLOT PROPOSITION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND MEASURE ELECTION FOR NOVEMBER 5, 2024

"To repair/ upgrade older schools; fix deteriorating roofs, dry rot, plumbing, electrical; remove asbestos/ lead pipes; improve student safety/ security; and support college/ career readiness in math, science, engineering, technology, arts, and skilled trades by modernizing classrooms, science labs, school facilities, technology, shall Jurupa Unified School District's measure be adopted authorizing \$180,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying 4 cents per \$100 assessed value (\$12,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, with citizen oversight and all money locally controlled?"

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District certifies that it has evaluated the District's urgent and critical school needs, including school and student safety issues, enrollment trends, class size reduction, overcrowding, energy efficiency and computer technology, seismic safety requirements, and aging, outdated or deteriorating school buildings in developing the scope of projects to be funded. The Board of Education will prioritize the key health and safety and sustainability needs so that the most critical school site needs are addressed. The District conducted an evaluation at all school sites and received public input in developing the scope of school projects to be funded. In approving this Project List, the Board of Education determines that the District should:

- (i) Upgrade safety and security systems.
- (ii) Provide career technical classrooms, facilities and labs for job training to prepare students for the workforce.
- (iii) Upgrade classrooms and labs to support the core academics of math, science, reading and writing.
- (iv) Renovate and repair buildings, classrooms, fields and playground areas.
- (v) Adhere to specific **FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY** safeguards such as these:
 - (a) Sacramento will be prohibited from taking any of the funds raised.
 - (b) All expenditures will be subject to annual independent financial and performance audits.
 - (c) No funds will be used for administrators' salaries and pensions.
 - (d) All funds will be subject to <u>local control</u> and provide improvements at all of our schools.
 - (e) An independent citizens' oversight committee will be appointed to ensure that all funds are spent only as authorized.

The Project List includes the following types of projects:

Neighborhood School Renovation, Repair and Upgrade Projects

<u>Goal and Purpose</u>: Schools will benefit from the renovation, repair, upgrade, furnishing and equipment of deteriorating, outdated school buildings, science labs, classrooms, computer learning centers and school libraries and athletic and fine arts facilities, in order to ensure compliance with handicap accessibility requirements and that students and teachers have the resources they need to excel and students are prepared for college and careers when they graduate, by undertaking the following:

- · Upgrade, furnish and equip classrooms, STEAM labs, English labs, science labs and multipurpose rooms and facilities.
- · Provide improved, upgraded computer labs.
- Replace and add electrical service capacity to relieve currently overloaded electrical systems.
- Repair, upgrade and replace roofs, as needed.
- Comply with Federal and State-mandated Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) handicap accessibility requirements.

School Health, Safety and Security, and Earthquake Safety Projects

- Install new security systems, such as security (surveillance) cameras, outdoor lighting, fencing, gates and classroom door locks.
- Remove or abate asbestos, lead paint, mold and other hazardous materials.
- Upgrade emergency communication systems.
- Upgrade fire alarm systems to automatic systems, repair and replace fire safety equipment, add sprinklers and fire safety doors.

- Upgrades to schools in order to meet handicap accessibility requirements.
- Replace/upgrade existing signage, bells and clocks.
- Upgrade and replace playground equipment and athletic fields to meet current safety standards.

In addition to the projects stated above, proceeds from the sale of bonds will also be used for payment of facility-related construction costs, the acquisition of land, the payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility assessment reviews, facility master plan updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring) and construction documentation, the acquisition or prepayment of outstanding ground leases, acquiring and leasing of real property for school facilities or new school construction, including the purchase of leased facilities and the refinancing of outstanding lease obligations, including, but not limited to, the refinancing of existing lease obligations of the District, acquiring and leasing of property for temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by bond-financed Projects and the leasing or acquisition of staff parking or a transportation lot for school buses. Bond proceeds may be used to replace and upgrade technology infrastructure, which includes all necessary infrastructure, hardware, and software, and is not limited to wiring and electrical systems; computers; tablets; projectors and display systems; portable interface devices; centralized storage and backup systems; uninterruptible power supplies; racks; servers; switches; routers; modules; sound systems; access control systems; printers; digital white boards; upgraded voice-over IP; videoconferencing equipment; communications software and systems; collaborative systems; network management software; enterprise-wide software; and other modern equipment conducive to a modern learning environment.

In addition to the projects listed above, the District may construct new classrooms and school facilities and/or a new school, to accommodate enrollment growth. The repair and renovation of each of the existing school facilities, as well as the construction of a new school, may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: construction and/or repair or renovation of student and staff restrooms; installation, repair and replacement of heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems; construction, installation and upgrade of facilities for energy efficiency and to reduce fire risks; construction or repair and replacement of worn-out and leaky roofs, insulation, windows, walls, doors and drinking fountains, and construction and installation of the same; demolition of unsafe school facilities; installation of wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices and needs; installation, repairing and replacing fire alarms, emergency communications and security systems; surfacing, resurfacing or replacing of hard courts and floors; turf, irrigation and sprinkler systems and campus landscaping; building new and/or renovating existing gymnasiums, pools and high school stadiums including constructing or acquisition of scoreboards, and other furnishings and equipment; deferred maintenance projects; construction, rehabilitation or improvement of signage; upgrading, rehabilitating or replacing inadequate libraries, multipurpose rooms, food service, cafeterias, kitchens and administrative support spaces, or construction of the same; upgrading locker rooms; installing or rehabilitating lunch shelters, artificial turf, and bleachers; improving sanitation and recycling; construction of or expansion of parking; installing or rehabilitating interior and exterior painting and floor covering; removing and replacing portable classrooms; installing or rehabilitating covered walkways or shelters; construction, rehabilitation or upgrading school site cafeterias and kitchens; repairing rubberized play apparatus surfaces; demolition; construction, repair or rehabilitation of various forms of storage and support spaces; upgrading or rehabilitation of classrooms; repairing, upgrading and installing interior and exterior lighting systems; installing or replacing water and sewer lines and other plumbing systems; and installation of new security fences and systems and replacing outdated security fences and security systems. Any project herein may include construction or reconstruction of any facilities to comply with accessibility requirements under the Americans with Disabilities Act; the removal or abatement of asbestos, lead paint, mold or other hazardous materials; or improvements to meet State seismic and other structural integrity standards.

Any of the projects listed herein may be completed in conjunction with other public agencies, including education, city, county or college institutions, for the construction of libraries, child care centers, multi-purpose rooms, gymnasiums, athletic facilities, or any other authorized project, to increase the efficient use of bond proceeds. Projects and upgrades listed above may be completed as needed, and any of such projects may

or may not be completed as a joint use project with another public entity, as determined by the Board. The District may also pursue public-private partnerships or partnerships with nonprofit entities to complete any of the projects listed herein and reduce costs to the District, in compliance with applicable law, and at the direction of the Board.

The allocation of bond proceeds will be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each Project, and completion of the bond projects listed above is subject to the availability of adequate funding to the District. Approval of Measure V does not guarantee that the proposed Project or Projects within the District that are the subject of bonds under Measure V will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by Measure V. The District's proposal for the project or projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure or additional measures. In the absence of State matching funds, which the District will aggressively pursue to reduce the District's share of the costs of the Projects, the District may not be able to complete some of the Projects listed above.

The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing or installing irrigation, storm drain, and utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the costs of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects. Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the specific purposes identified herein. When specific projects are included herein, they are presented to provide examples and are not intended to limit the generality of the broader description of authorized projects. The order in which particular projects are listed is not intended to indicate priority for funding or completion. Projects will be accomplished to address deficiencies and priorities as enumerated by the Board or in the District's facilities master plan. In addition, authorized projects include reimbursements for paid project costs and paying and/or prepaying interim or previously obtained financing for the types of projects included on the project list, such as bond anticipation notes or lease financings including certificates of participation relating to facilities projects and/or equipment previously financed.

As required by the California Constitution, the proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be used only for the provision of school facilities by construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, refinancing or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

The District will conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the funds have been expended only on projects included in the Project List set forth above.

The District will conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of those proceeds have been expended on projects included in the Project List set forth above.

Pursuant to Section 15772 of the Education Code, the Board will appoint a citizens' oversight committee and conduct annual independent audits to assure that bond proceeds are spent only on projects included in the Project List set forth above and for no other purposes.

<u>NO ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES</u>. PROCEEDS FROM THE SALE OF THE BONDS AUTHORIZED BY THIS PROPOSITION SHALL BE USED ONLY FOR THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, RECONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION, OR REPLACEMENT OF SCHOOL FACILITIES, INCLUDING THE FURNISHING AND EQUIPPING OF FACILITIES, AND NOT FOR ANY OTHER PURPOSE, INCLUDING PENSIONS, TEACHER AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES AND OTHER OPERATING EXPENSES.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE (EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15278 ET SEQ.) TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATIVES OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

An election will be held in Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") on November 5, 2024, for the purpose of submitting to the electors of the District the question of incurring a bonded indebtedness of the District in the principal amount of \$180,000,000. If such bonds are authorized and sold, the principal thereof and interest thereon will be payable from the proceeds of taxes levied on the taxable property in the District. The following information regarding tax rates is given in compliance with Section 9401 of the California Elections Code. This information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the assessed valuations of taxable property in the District, and assuming the entire debt service on the bonds will be paid through property taxation:

- 1. The best estimate from official sources of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or on a projection based on experience within the District or other demonstrable factors, is \$40.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed. The final year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is 2053-54.
- 2. The best estimate from official sources of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or a projection based on experience within the District or other demonstrable factors is \$40.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed and the year 2031-32.
- 3. The best estimate from official sources of the total debt service, including the principal and interest that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold, is \$332 million.

Attention of voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates. The actual timing of sales of the bonds and the amount to be sold at any time will be governed by the needs of the District and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold, which will not exceed the maximum permitted by law, will depend upon the bond market at the time of sale. The actual assessed valuations in future years will depend upon the value of property within the District as determined in the assessment and the equalization process. Assessed valuation is not the same as market price of real property. Therefore, the actual tax rates and the years in which those tax rates will be applicable may vary from those presently estimated and stated above.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE "V"

State law authorizes school districts to sell bonds to finance improvements of student safety/security; build new classrooms/schools to relieve overcrowding; fix roofs and plumbing/electrical/ventilation systems; and repair/upgrade classrooms, science labs, and school facilities that support instruction in science, technology, engineering, arts, math, skilled trades and reading. Monies generated by the sale of such bonds may only be spent for these specified purposes. Bond proceeds cannot be expended to finance teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses.

The Jurupa Unified School District ("District") has called for an election on the question of whether bonds should be issued and sold by the District. Such bonds can only be issued and sold if at least 55% of the persons who actually vote approve Measure "V." The bonds would be repaid through an increase in property taxes based upon the assessed value of taxable property in the District in each year of repayment. The Tax Rate Statement, which appears following the full text of Measure "V" in this voter information pamphlet, reflects the District's current best estimate of the property tax rate increases that will be required to service the bonds at various points during the life of the bonds. At the time of issuance, the projected annual tax to be levied to meet debt service requirements for the proposed bonds is 4.0¢ per \$100 (or \$40.00 per \$100,000) of assessed value.

If Measure "V" is approved, bonds may be issued in series and must be repaid within a maximum statutory term of twenty-five (25) years. The maximum interest rate chargeable on the bonds is regulated by state law. The actual interest rates at which the bonds are sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale.

The District proposes to issue and sell bonds in an aggregate principal amount of one hundred eighty million dollars (\$180,000,000). Money raised by the sale of the bonds must be used exclusively to finance the list of projects described in the full text of Measure "V," which is included in this voter information pamphlet ("Bond Project List"). When developing the Bond Project List, the District was required by state law to evaluate safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs. Inclusion of a particular project on the Bond Project List, however, is not a guarantee that the project will actually be funded or completed.

If Measure "V" is approved and the bonds are sold, the District will appoint a citizens oversight committee, and conduct annual independent financial and performance audits to ensure that bond funds are spent only on the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or leasing of school facilities and for no other purposes.

Approval of Measure "V" will have no effect on existing law but will allow for the issuance and sale of bonds in accordance with the terms of existing law and Measure "V".

A "YES" VOTE MEANS the District $\underline{\it will}$ be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.

A "NO" VOTE MEANS the District $\underline{\textit{will not}}$ be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.

To repair/upgrade local community colleges, improve access to affordable higher education for careers/skilled trades/ university transfer; provide safe drinking water; meet earthquake, disability access and safety regulations; upgrade security; acquire, construct, repair facilities, sites, equipment; shall Riverside Community College District's measure be adopted, authorizing \$954,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying \$19 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (\$57,000,000 annually while bonds are outstanding), with oversight, audits/ spending disclosure?"

SPECIFIC PROJECT LIST

The Board of Trustees of the Riverside Community College District, to be responsive to the needs of its community, evaluated Moreno Valley College's, Norco College's, and Riverside City College's continuing urgent and critical facility needs, and its capacity to provide local students with an affordable education and prepare them for success in college and careers. **Job training, college transfer** and veterans' support facilities, **campus safety** issues, class size and offerings, and information and computer technology were each considered, in developing the type of projects to be funded. In developing the types of projects described herein, job training facilities, facilities supporting college transfer and career training classrooms and labs, and the expansion of **opportunities for local students** and veterans to receive an **affordable, high-quality education,** were **prioritized**. If these facility needs are not addressed now, each of Moreno Valley, Norco and Riverside City Colleges would be unable to remain competitive in preparing students for jobs in high demand industries, the **skilled trades** and **transfer to four-year colleges and universities**.

The Board of Trustees determines that the Riverside Community College District must:

- (i) Prepare students for good jobs and careers;
- (ii) Improve access to affordable education;
- (iii) Provide safe drinking water and upgrade safety and security;
- (iv) Upgrade classrooms and labs for science, technology, engineering, job training and training in the skilled trades;
- (v) Make basic repairs to older buildings;
- (vi) Ensure each local College campus receives their fair share of funding from this measure.

The types of projects which are authorized to be undertaken at Riverside Community College District include:

PROVIDE AFFORDABLE JOB TRAINING AND COLLEGE TRANSFER:

Classroom, Technology, and Program Improvements To Help Local Students, and Veterans Transfer to Four-Year Universities;

Be Trained For Careers Including the Skilled Trades, Nursing and First Responders

Goals and Purposes:

Many of the buildings, classrooms, science labs, and job training equipment at the local community colleges are deteriorating and outdated. This measure will address urgent, basic and future repair needs such as removing asbestos, mold and lead paint; upgrading outdated electrical wiring and gas and sewer lines; fixing leaky roofs; and improving earthquake safety to make sure all students learn in classrooms that are clean and safe.

This measure will allow for local community colleges to expand and improve classrooms and workspaces and develop the Inland Empire Technical Trade Center to prepare our students for careers in skilled trades such as welders; electricians; and heating, ventilation, and air conditioning technicians. This will ensure our students are qualified for these in-demand, good-paying jobs and provide the workforce our area needs.

Our local community colleges train a large number of the nurses, firefighters, police officers and paramedics in our area. This measure will help improve and repair training facilities, classrooms and labs to address the local shortage of nurses and public safety personnel and ensure they are trained on the latest life-saving technology and techniques, and for future public health and natural disaster emergencies.

- Upgrade emergency-response equipment used to train local first-responders.
- Upgrade and equip classrooms and labs for training nurses and other healthcare professionals.

- Expand Riverside City College's nursing training program and partnerships with local universities and hospitals.
- Expand training in science, technology, engineering, arts, and math at Moreno Valley College and Norco College so local students
 do not have to travel to other colleges.
- Expand training facilities for firefighters, paramedics, police officers and the skilled trades.
- Upgrade classrooms and labs for science, technology, engineering, job training, vocational and skilled jobs training.
- Upgrade and expanding career technical education facilities.
- Update learning technology.
- Improve educational resources, as well as career and academic counseling resource centers for veterans.

PROVIDE LOCAL STUDENTS A HIGH QUALITY AFFORDABLE EDUCATION

IN A SAFE ENVIRONMENT:

Basic Improvements Needed To Allow Moreno Valley College, Norco College, and Riverside City College to Provide Job Training and Vocational

Programs That Are Needed To Prepare Students For Good-Paying Local Jobs

Goals and Purposes: The cost to attend California's public universities has risen to at least six times that of attending a community college. This measure increases opportunities for local students to earn college credits and certifications, and learn job skills at an affordable price, and then transfer to four-year colleges and universities without generating crushing debt.

Tens of thousands of local residents rely on Riverside Community College District's colleges each year to get the job training, technical knowledge and specialized skills they need to compete for good-paying, modern careers. This measure will allow our local community colleges to upgrade career programs and partnerships with local employers, so students are prepared for our region's changing economy and today's in-demand careers in nursing and healthcare, police, firefighting, skilled trades, social work, teaching, technology, engineering and more.

- Ensure college buildings continue to meet earthquake and fire safety regulations.
- Repair leaky roofs and deteriorating gas and sewer lines.
- Upgrade campus safety for emergencies such as active shooters.
- Remove asbestos and lead paint.
- Provide safe drinking water.
- Increase safety lighting on campus and in parking lots.
- Repair bathrooms, plumbing, and aging water pipes and drinking fountains.

Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program/project management, inspection services, staff training expenses, a customary contingency, and costs associated with the Total Cost of Ownership of facilities and equipment. In addition to the listed types of projects stated above, the types of authorized projects of the measure also include the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including interim funding incurred to advance fund projects and the refinancing of outstanding lease obligations, payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, fiscal reporting, feasibility studies, due diligence, inspection and assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, project management information systems, permit

fees, inspection services, and temporary housing of dislocated college activities caused by construction projects. In addition to the projects listed above, repair, renovation and construction projects may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: renovate student and staff restrooms; replace aging electrical and plumbing systems; replace and upgrade stormwater and sewer systems; replace and upgrade underground chilled water lines for campus heating and cooling systems; repair and replace heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems; install building management and energy management systems; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies and decarbonization programs, including, as an example, the installation of solar panels or arrays, electric charging stations, chiller replacements, heat pumps and furnaces; repair and replace worn-out and leaky roofs, windows, walls doors and drinking fountains and broken or cracked concrete or asphalt; replace or remove outdated buildings and classrooms and construct new classrooms and support buildings; upgrade wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices and needs; upgrade facilities to meet current environmental sustainability, State compliance standards and earthquake safety; repair and replace fire alarms, fire safety equipment, emergency communications and security systems, closed circuit television and card access security doors systems; upgrade, resurface, replacing or relocate hard courts, fields, turf and irrigation systems; replace turf and running track systems on athletic fields; upgrade classrooms; build new or renovate existing facilities such as science buildings, advanced technology buildings, wellness/allied health facilities, early childhood education center, business and technical support facilities, cosmetology building, emergency operations center, career and technical education buildings, child development center, student services and welcome centers, bookstore, dining, food services, parking structures and lots; plan, acquire, construct, and/or contribute to the development of employee and student housing units; build new or upgrade sports fields, gymnasiums, athletics complex/stadium, pools, volleyball and tennis courts, and other athletic facilities; upgrade, resurface and recondition existing parking lots, roads and sidewalks; construct or upgrade on-site and off-site roads and roadways and related off-site improvements; improve vehicular access and circulation; improve drop-off zones; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems; upgrade and expand the Ben Clark Public Safety Training Center, replace water lines and valves and sewer lines; construct, upgrade, acquire or expand, multi-use classrooms and labs, swing space, veterans and student/learning resources centers, student libraries, planetarium, outdoor classrooms/performance space, fine/ theater and visual arts, music and performing arts facilities, greenhouse, kinesiology buildings, police facilities, field lights, bleachers, grandstands, press box, track replacement, collaborative office suites and administrative offices, purchasing, warehouse and maintenance facilities, and public safety facilities; improve water conservation and energy efficiency; acquire land; replace existing window systems with energy-efficient systems to reduce costs; improve insulation, weatherproofing and roofs to reduce costs; improve access for the disabled; install and repair fire safety equipment, including alarms, smoke detectors, sprinklers, emergency lighting, and fire safety doors; replace broken concrete walks, deteriorated asphalt; replace/upgrade existing signage to reflect better wayfinding, bells and clocks; replace, modernize and upgrade existing elevator systems; demolition of unsafe or outdated facilities; install or upgrade new security systems, such as security (surveillance) cameras, burglar alarms, handrails, outdoor lighting, fencing, landscaping, gates, gateways and classroom key cards/door locks; replace sewer lines and improve drainage systems to prevent flooding; abate, remove, remediate existing above and below ground hazardous materials; replace, upgrade, construct, map and improve underground utilities infrastructure and above ground utilities structures; upgrade roadway and pedestrian paths and pathways and bridges for improved safety and access for emergency vehicles, site parking, utilities and grounds. Current priority projects at the three colleges include, at Moreno Valley College, the construction of a library and learning resource center, a bookstore and food services facility, a biological and physical sciences (STEM) facility, a kinesiology and athletics complex, a fine and performing arts complex, campus safety and operation center, and a parking structure, the reconstruction of a humanities building, and a science and technology facility; at Norco College, the construction of a center for human performance and kinesiology, a library and learning resource center and student services, STEM buildings, a student services welcome center and a parking structure, the reconstruction of the applied technology education center/information technology, student center, science and technology facility, library and humanities, and the Corona Education Center for educational, technical, and workforce training; and at Riverside City College the construction of a cosmetology building, an advanced technology building, visual and performing arts complex, a kinesiology facility, a stadium improvements and a facilities complex and the reconstruction of MLK and planetarium building and Bradshaw building; at Ben Clark Training Center, the construction of School of Public Safety Phase II; at Inland Empire Trade Technical Center, the construction of the new educational, work-based learning and technical training facilities. These priorities may change over the years and other similar projects of the types described my be funded along with or in lieu of those priority projects described.

The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, upgrading classroom technology, expanding wireless internet access throughout each college campus, acquire portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, information systems, printers, digital white boards, upgrade voice-over-IP, communication systems, audio/visual and telecommunications systems, call manager and network security/firewall, Internet connectivity, wireless systems, technology infrastructure, and other miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, DATA storage, fiber/copper infrastructure, phones, identity access cards and the construction and installation of a data center in the cloud for District's enterprise systems, such as resource planning, websites, domain name systems, cloud applications and information security, as well as the necessary software and licenses associated therewith.

The allocation of bond proceeds may be affected by the final costs of each project. Some projects may be undertaken as joint use or public/ private partnership projects in cooperation with other local public, non-profit agencies or other entities. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project or decisions will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final budgets of projects or on the then current priorities of the District, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be undertaken. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration, including the acquisition and installation of temporary facilities (swing space) may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing traffic signals, sewer, irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, widening roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects. Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the types of projects and purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code Section 53410.

MEASURE "CC"- RIVERSIDE COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

TAX RATE STATEMENT

An election will be held in the Riverside Community College District (the "District") on November 5, 2024 to authorize the sale of up to \$954,000,000 in general obligation bonds (the "2024 Bond Authorization"). If such bonds are authorized and sold, principal and interest on the bonds will be payable only from the proceeds of *ad valorem tax* levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is submitted in compliance with Sections 9400-9406 of the Elections Code of the State of California. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

The following information is provided pursuant to Elections Code Section 9401:

- The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of
 the bond debt service, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$19.00 per \$100,000 of
 assessed valuation. It is currently expected that the tax will be collected until fiscal year 2058-59.
- 2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, for each year that bonds are outstanding, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$19.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation, which is projected to be the same in every fiscal year the bonds remain outstanding.
- 3. The best estimate of total debt service, including principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold will be approximately \$1.9 billion.

Voters should note that these estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources, and are based on the assessed value (<u>not</u> market value) of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts and durations and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold at each sale and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE "CC"

State law authorizes school districts to sell bonds to finance improvements of student safety/security and access; acquire, construct, and repair facilities, sites, and equipment. Monies generated by the sale of such bonds may only be spent for these specified purposes. Bond proceeds cannot be expended to finance teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses.

The Riverside Community College District ("District") has called for an election on the question of whether bonds should be issued and sold by the District. Such bonds can only be issued and sold if at least 55% of the persons who actually vote approve Measure "CC." The bonds would be repaid through an increase in property taxes based upon the assessed value of taxable property in the District in each year of repayment. The Tax Rate Statement, which appears following the full text of Measure "CC" in this voter information pamphlet, reflects the District's current best estimate of the property tax rate increases that will be required to service the bonds at various points during the life of the bonds. At the time of issuance, the projected annual tax to be levied to meet debt service requirements for the proposed bonds is .019¢ per \$100 (or \$19 per \$100,000) of assessed value.

If Measure "CC" is approved, bonds may be issued in series and must be repaid within a maximum statutory term of twenty-five (25) years. The maximum interest rate chargeable on the bonds is regulated by state law. The actual interest rates at which the bonds are sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale.

The District proposes to issue and sell bonds in an aggregate principal amount of nine hundred fifty four million dollars (\$954,000,000). Money raised by the sale of the bonds must be used exclusively to finance the list of projects described in the full text of Measure "CC," which is included in this voter information pamphlet ("Bond Project List"). When developing the Bond Project List, the District was required by state law to evaluate safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs. Inclusion of a particular project on the Bond Project List, however, is not a guarantee that the project will actually be funded or completed.

If Measure "CC" is approved and the bonds are sold, the District will appoint a citizens oversight committee, and conduct annual independent financial and performance audits to ensure that bond funds are spent only on the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or leasing of school facilities and for no other purposes.

Approval of Measure "CC" will have no effect on existing law but will allow for the issuance and sale of bonds in accordance with the terms of existing law and Measure "CC".

A "YES" VOTE MEANS the District will be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.

A "NO" VOTE MEANS the District will not be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.





RIGHTS

YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS:



The right to vote if you are a registered voter. You are eligible to vote if you are:

- a U.S. citizen living in California
- at least 18 years old
- registered where you currently live
- not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony
- not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court



The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list. You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.



The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.



The right to cast a secret ballot without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.



The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake, if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:

Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot,

Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place, or

Vote using a provisional ballot.



The right to get help casting your ballot from anyone you choose, except from your

employer or union representative.



The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place in California.



The right to get election materials in a language other than English if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.



The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.



The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.
