

Election Day is just around the corner on November 5, 2024! Your County Voter Information Guide is here, providing essential details for voting, including instructions on marking your ballot, candidate information, a sample ballot, and other important election details to review before you vote. Tip: You can mark your sample ballot and bring it with you to any Vote Center for easy reference.

Starting October 7, 2024, ballots will be mailed to all active registered voters. You can check your registration at <u>voterstatus.sos.ca.gov</u> or register at <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>.

Vote at any vote center. We have more days and more ways to cast your ballot!

- Returning Your Ballot: You may drop off your ballot at any secure ballot Drop-Off Location starting October 7, 2024, or mail your ballot via USPS (no postage needed).
- Receiving Your Ballot: Your ballot must be received by the Registrar of Voters by Election Day or postmarked on Election Day and received within seven days (November 12, 2024).
- Tracking Your Ballot: Register at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov.

Early Voting: Vote in person at the Registrar of Voters office starting October 7, 2024, (excluding holidays) 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Hours change on October 26 - 27, and November 2 - 3 to 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. For a list of locations and hours, visit voteinfo.net.

Election Day: All Vote Centers, including the Registrar of Voters office, will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

The voter registration deadline is October 21, 2024. For more information or questions, call us at (951) 486-7200.

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Previously known as partisan offices, voter-nominated offices include state legislative offices, United States congressional offices, and state constitutional offices.

In both the open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), a general election still must be held.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices may still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate may only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for United States President, county central committee, or local offices.

California law requires the following information to be printed in this guide.

Party-Nominated/Partisan Offices

Political parties may formally nominate candidates for party-nominated/partisan offices at the primary election. A nominated candidate will represent that party as its official candidate for the specific office at the general election and the ballot will reflect an official designation. The top vote-getter for each party at the primary election moves on to the general election. Parties also elect officers of county central committees at the primary election.

A voter can only vote in the primary election of the political party he or she has disclosed a preference for upon registering to vote. However, a political party may allow a person who has declined to disclose a party preference to vote in that party's primary election.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have his or her qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In the county voter information guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, if they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.

MEASURE "T" - LAKE ELSINORE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

BOND PROPOSITION OF THE LAKE ELSINORE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (November 5, 2024):

"In order to acquire, construct and reconstruct school facilities and new schools, and provide for supporting infrastructure at the existing school sites of the Lake Elsinore Unified School District, and in so doing increase health, safety, welfare and educational effectiveness of classrooms for students, shall the Lake Elsinore Unified School District be authorized to issue Bonds in an amount not to exceed \$198,000,000, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities or the acquisition or lease of real property for schools and school facilities listed in Attachment "1" on file at the District office and herein incorporated, which Bonds shall be issued for a term not to exceed the applicable statutory maximum, which is currently twenty-five (25) years in the case of bonds issued under the authority of the Education Code and forty (40) years in the case of bonds issued under the authority of the Government Code, at an interest rate below the legal maximum, and which Bonds shall be subject to the following provisions:

- (A) That proceeds of the Bonds shall be used only for the construction of school facilities and supporting infrastructure, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities pursuant to California Constitution Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) and further that the proceeds of the Bonds shall be used only for the purposes specified in California Constitution Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) (as amended by Proposition 39) and not for any other purpose, including teacher and non-construction related administrator salaries and any other school operating expenses.
- (B) That a list of the specific school facilities projects to be funded with the proceeds of the Bonds is attached hereto as Attachment "1" and, based upon the adoption of this Resolution, this Governing Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing the school facilities listed in Attachment "1".
- (C) That the Governing Board of the District shall conduct an annual, independent performance audit to insure that the proceeds from the sale of the Bonds have been expended only on the specific projects listed in this bond proposition.
- (D) That the Governing Board of the District shall conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the Bonds until all of those proceeds have been expended for the school facilities projects identified herein.
- (E) That the Governing Board of the District will, pursuant to the provisions of applicable State law, appoint a citizens' oversight committee, and conduct annual independent audits (as referenced above) to assure that the Bond proceeds are spent only on the school, facilities and classroom improvements, projects and costs identified in Attachment "1" and for no other purposes.

Repayment Projections: The tax levied to repay the Bonds is estimated to average \$11,000,000 annually anticipated to be collected through 2060-61 at a rate of approximately \$0.028 per \$100 / \$28.00 per \$100,000 of assessed value as further set out in the Tax Rate Statement provided to voters with this bond measure.

Taxpayer Protections: The following taxpayer protections are specifically provided in this Bond Measure and by law:

- Bond funds shall be used only for the school facilities projects identified herein, and not for any other purpose.
- As required by law, an Independent Citizen's Oversight Committee shall oversee expenditures of bond funds, and related matters, and shall report to the Governing Board and communicate with the public on such expenditures.
- As required by law, the School District shall conduct annual financial audits and performance audits (using independent auditors) for all bond funds.
 - Bond Funds shall not be used for teacher or non-construction related administrator salaries or other non-construction related operating expenses."

LAKE ELSINORE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

SCHOOL FACILITIES PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED WITH PROCEEDS OF BONDS

The general obligation bond funds of the Lake Elsinore Unified School District ("District") would be used to provide additional classrooms and support facilities, to create a 21st Century technology learning environment at District schools to upgrade and complete upgrades and repairs and related facilities costs on a District-wide basis at schools and school facilities as further identified and discussed below:

GOALS FOR DISTRICT-WIDE SCHOOL FACILITIES IMPROVEMENTS

It is the objective of the District's Governing Board that the bond funded projects will occur at schools and school sites throughout the District with the goals of providing the following:

Classrooms, labs and equipment for career and technology education classes so students are prepared for college and in-demand jobs in fields like health sciences, engineering, technology and skilled trades

- Improved student safety and campus security systems, including security fencing, security cameras, emergency communications systems, smoke detectors, fire alarms and sprinklers
- > The facilities and technology needed to support high quality instruction in math and science
- > Upgrades to old, worn-out playground equipment, play fields and sports fields to meet current health and safety standards
- The facilities and equipment needed to support high quality instruction in music and the arts
- Improved heating, ventilation, insulation, doors and windows to increase energy efficiency and save money
- > Additional classrooms and schools to reduce student overcrowding and support student education for a 21st-Century learning environment

DISTRICT-WIDE 21st CENTURY INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM

These projects include preparation, planning, design, procurement, installation, furnishings and equipment to support instructional technology/infrastructure, keep pace with new technology, provide high-speed access to information and learning in classrooms and teacher stations and will occur at schools and school sites throughout the District, which will include the following:

- Upgrade/expand technology systems and equipment to support teaching and learning to keep pace with 21st Century standards
- Increase broadband to improve communications access for high-speed data transmission
- Upgrade learning technology infrastructure
- Expansion/renovation of computer science labs and teaching stations
- Installing and upgrading network infrastructure, including lighting and electrical systems and wiring to safely accommodate and support computers, technology, media presentation, communications and other electrical and/or electronic devices and systems

These projects include preparation, planning, design and architectural work, acquisition, construction and installation projects, furnishings and equipment (as further described herein) and supporting infrastructure costs (as further described below).

These projects may be undertaken at the District schools and school sites listed below under the heading "DISTRICT SCHOOL SITES FOR BOND PROGRAM"

NEW SCHOOLS AND UPDATED CLASSROOMS PROGRAM - TO MEET STUDENT EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND TO REDUCE OVERCROWDING

Proceeds of the Bonds may be used to design, acquire, construct, furnish and equip new elementary schools and add new classrooms and school facilities at existing District schools with the goals of meeting student educational needs and reducing student overcrowding. These projects will include the following:

- Provide additional classrooms and support facilities at the District's existing elementary schools
- Acquire land for one new elementary school to reduce student overcrowding at existing schools
- Construct two new elementary schools

These projects also include the following at new schools and existing school sites:

- Make health and safety renovations and/or improvements
- Modernize and upgrade old playgrounds, fields, and athletic areas to meet current health and safety standards
- Upgrade/improve HVAC systems, repair and/or replace roofs & roofing systems, lighting and electrical systems to increase energy efficiency and save money
- Installing new and upgraded security systems, fencing, cameras, emergency communications, electronic door locking systems and fire/earthquake safety systems
- Handicap accessibility improvements to meet current health, safety and instructional standards
- Upgrade and/or replace plumbing and sewer systems and facilities including, but not limited to, restrooms
- Replacing/upgrading athletic facilities, including swimming pools, locker rooms and supporting facilities
- Improve student safety by replacing outdated/inadequate fire alarm and fire suppression systems including, but not limited to, fire safety equipment

Acquisition and construction projects would include, but not be limited to, site acquisition, classrooms, offices, cafeterias, gymnasiums, playing fields and other athletic facilities, school grounds, auditoriums, science and computer labs, libraries, restrooms, and other school facilities and supporting infrastructure. This may include site preparation, design costs, environmental and environmental control costs, consultant costs and site finish work, equipment and other costs as further described herein. The exact size, configuration and location of each school will be determined by the Governing Board based on the needs of the District.

These projects may be undertaken at the District schools and school sites listed below under the heading "DISTRICT SCHOOL SITES FOR BOND PROGRAM"

The Bond Program projects undertaken at each school/school site will be determined by the Governing Board based on the needs of the District.

ALL DISTRICT SCHOOL SITES WHERE RENOVATION, MAJOR REPAIRS AND/OR NEW CONSTRUCTION TO BE UNDERTAKEN:

- Remove and mitigate hazardous materials (e.g. asbestos, lead, PCB, mold, mildew, etc.) where necessary.
- Improve contingencies as required to comply with existing building codes and state/federal requirements, including access requirements of the ADA.
- Provide adequate furniture and equipment for all classrooms, and spaces to be newly constructed, modernized or reconstructed.
- Acquisition of any of the facilities on this School Facilities Project List through temporary lease or lease-purchase arrangements or execute purchase option under lease for any of these authorized facilities.
- Necessary site preparation/restoration in connection with renovation or remodeling, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or
 installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or
 rights of ways to property.
- If the Governing Board determines that replacement is more economical than rehabilitation, improvement, or renovation of existing classrooms/ school facilities, in those particular cases replacement/new construction will be explored/pursued.
- Provide temporary (interim) classrooms and other school facilities as needed to during construction, including, but not limited to, relocation costs.
- The costs to demolish/remove facilities when no longer needed and the costs to restore site and utility systems after removal.
- Modernization upgrade or replacement of structures includes permanent, portable, or modular structures.

Project Costs for Furnishings and Equipment

Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, fixtures, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program/project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the list also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the list; installation of signage and fencing; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, computers, projectors, portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, printers, digital white boards, document projectors, telephone system, call manager and network security/firewall, wireless technology systems and other miscellaneous equipment and software.

Incidental Costs - Incidental costs include, but are not limited to: costs of design, engineering, architect, legal and other professional services, facilities assessments, labor and material costs, sewer capacity improvements, inspections, site preparation, utilities, landscaping, construction management by third parties, general contractors and/or District personnel, and other planning and permitting, environmental review, rezoning and municipal license fees if any, legal, accounting and similar costs; independent annual financial and performance audits; a customary construction contingency; demolition and disposal of existing structures; the costs of interim housing and storage during construction including relocation and construction costs incurred relating to interim facilities; rental or construction of storage facilities and other space on an interim basis for materials and other equipment and furnishings displaced during construction;

costs of relocating facilities and equipment as needed in connection with the projects; interim classrooms and facilities for students, administrators, and school functions, including modular facilities; all federal, state and locally-mandated safety upgrades; the costs of new or expanded infrastructure; the cost of providing parking and other facilities to accommodate new or expanded facilities; addressing any unforeseen conditions revealed by construction/modernization and other necessary improvements required to comply with existing building codes, including the Field Act; complying with all access requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act and similar laws and regulations; costs of the election; project construction oversight, management and administration during the duration of such projects, including by District personnel.

Project costs for the above-referenced projects may include project management/construction management costs, warranty costs, master facilities planning, state or local costs or expenses involving design, planning, site and facilities development costs and charges, environmental review(s) and proceedings, audit costs, direct legal costs and related costs. Project costs may also include the payment or prepayment of existing or future lease payments and/or interim financing costs for lease of authorized facilities, property or buildings, prepayment of lease obligations for facilities purposes (including temporary classroom facilities) and payment of costs and expenses for interim financing of authorized facilities (including, but not limited to, financing delivery costs). Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on, or necessary and incidental to, bond projects. Allowable project costs also include: costs of issuing the bonds or other securities (as authorized under California law), informational distribution costs and election costs authorized under State law.

The scope and nature of any of the specific projects described above may be altered by the District as required by unforeseen conditions that may arise during the course of design and accomplishment of the projects. In the event that a modernization or renovation project is more economical for the District to be undertaken as new construction, this bond measure authorizes land acquisition, relocation and construction and/or reconstruction, and all costs relating thereto, for said reason or, alternatively, based on other considerations deemed in the best interest of the District by the Governing Board. In addition, this measure authorizes the acquisition of real property, including necessary rights of ways or other real property interests, required to expand District facilities, to provide access to school or other District facilities, or to provide additional school or related facilities.

Projects described within this list may be undertaken and used as joint use projects with other public agencies.

This School Facilities Project List describes the specific facilities and capital projects the District may finance with proceeds of the Bonds. In addition, authorized projects include reimbursements for paid project costs and paying and/or prepaying interim or previously obtained financing for the types of projects included on the project list, such as bond anticipation notes, and including payment and prepayment of lease payments relating to projects and/or equipment previously financed. Listed projects will be completed as needed at a particular school site according to Board-established priorities, and the order in which such projects appear on this School Facilities Project List is not an indication of priority for funding or completion. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded, and projects are completed. Certain construction funds expected from non-bond sources, including State grant funds for eligible projects, have not yet been secured. Until all project costs and funding sources are known, the Governing Board cannot determine the amount of bond proceeds available to be allocated for each project, nor guarantee that the bonds will provide sufficient funds to allow completion of all listed projects. Completion of some projects may be subject to further government approvals by State officials and boards, to local environmental review, and to input from the public. For these reasons, inclusion of a project on the School Facilities Projects List is not a guarantee that any specific project listed herein will be funded, constructed or completed by a specific date.

Interpretation - The terms of this Bond Measure and the words used in the School Facilities Project List shall be interpreted broadly to effect the purpose of providing broad and clear authority for the officers and employees of the District to provide for the school facilities projects the District proposes to finance with the proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition within the authority provided by law, including, but not limited to, Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, Education Code Section 15000 et seq. and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000. Words used in the Project List such as repair, improve, upgrade, expand, modernize, renovate, and reconfigure are used to describe school facilities projects in plain English but are not intended to expand the nature of such projects beyond what is authorized by law. As such, in accordance with legal requirements, the Bond Project List does not authorize, and shall not be interpreted to authorize, expending proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition for current maintenance, operation or repairs.

<u>Severability</u> - The District Board hereby declares, and the voters by approving this Bond Measure concur, that every section and part of this bond proposition has independent value, and the District Board and the voters would have adopted each provision hereof regardless of every other provision hereof. Upon approval of this measure by the voters, should any part be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, all remaining parts hereof shall remain in full force and effect to the fullest extent allowed by law, and to this end the provisions of this bond measure are severable.

In preparing the foregoing School Facilities Project List, the Governing Board of the Lake Elsinore Unified School District has evaluated safety, class size and information technology needs.

MEASURE "T"- LAKE ELSINORE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

TAX RATE STATEMENT

LAKE ELSINORE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND ELECTION OF NOVEMBER 5, 2024

As shown in the provided official ballot, an election is being held in the Lake Elsinore Unified School District ("District") on November 5, 2024, for the purpose of submitting to the registered voters within the District the question of whether the District shall be authorized to issue and sell bonds in an amount not to exceed \$198,000,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the specified school facilities and school projects as set forth in the resolution of the District calling such bond election. This measure will authorize an *ad valorem* tax sufficient for payment of interest on, and redemption of, the bonds. If authorized, the bonds shall bear interest at a rate, or rates, to be established at such time as the bonds are sold, in one or more series, at fixed or variable interest rates not to exceed the maximum applicable statutory rate for such bonds. If such bonds are authorized and sold, the principal thereof and the interest thereon are a general obligation of the District payable solely from the proceeds of *ad valorem* property taxes on taxable real property located within the District.

The following information is submitted in compliance with California Elections Code Sections 9401 through 9405 based on estimates of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement:

- (a) The best estimate from official sources of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue during the entire duration of the bond debt service (repayment of the bonds) based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, which is a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction or other demonstrable factors, is \$0.028 per \$100 (\$28.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year in which such tax is anticipated to be collected is 2060-2061.
- (b) The best estimate from official sources of the highest tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund such bond issue(s) based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, which is a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction or other demonstrable factors, is \$0.028 per \$100 (\$28.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation. It is estimated that this tax rate would apply in the 2025-2026 tax/fiscal year.
- (c) The best estimate of the total debt service, including principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is \$396,000,000.

Voters should note that these estimated tax rates are based on the assessed value of taxable property within the District as shown on the official rolls of Riverside County, <u>not</u> on the property's market value. In addition, taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption, will be taxed at a lower effective rate than described above. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the Riverside County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and/or tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that these estimates are based on assumptions and projections derived from information currently available and obtained from official sources. The actual tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of any bond sales, the amount of bonds sold, the maturities of the bonds issued and sold, market interest rates at the time of each sale of bonds and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The figures provided above are estimations based on the factors noted herein and are not maximum limitations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be governed by the needs of the District. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each such sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the Riverside County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE "T"

State law authorizes school districts to sell bonds to finance improvements of student safety/security; build new classrooms/schools to relieve overcrowding; fix roofs and plumbing/electrical/ventilation systems; and repair/upgrade classrooms, science labs, and school facilities that support instruction in science, technology, engineering, arts, math, and reading. Monies generated by the sale of such bonds may only be spent for these specified purposes. Bond proceeds cannot be expended to finance teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses.

The Lake Elsinore Unified School District ("District") has called for an election on the question of whether bonds should be issued and sold by the District. Such bonds can only be issued and sold if at least 55% of the persons who actually vote approve Measure "T." The bonds would be repaid through an increase in property taxes based upon the assessed value of taxable property in the District in each year of repayment. The Tax Rate Statement, which appears following the full text of Measure "T" in this voter information pamphlet, reflects the District's current best estimate of the property tax rate increases that will be required to service the bonds at various points during the life of the bonds. At the time of issuance, the projected annual tax to be levied to meet debt service requirements for the proposed bonds is 2.8¢ per \$100 (or \$28.00 per \$100,000) of assessed value.

If Measure "T" is approved, bonds may be issued in series and must be repaid within a maximum statutory term of twenty-five (25) years. The maximum interest rate chargeable on the bonds is regulated by state law. The actual interest rates at which the bonds are sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale.

The District proposes to issue and sell bonds in an aggregate principal amount of one hundred ninety-eight million dollars (\$198,000,000). Money raised by the sale of the bonds must be used exclusively to finance the list of projects described in the full text of Measure "T," which is included in this voter information pamphlet ("Bond Project List"). When developing the Bond Project List, the District was required by state law to evaluate safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs. Inclusion of a particular project on the Bond Project List, however, is not a guarantee that the project will actually be funded or completed.

If Measure "T" is approved and the bonds are sold, the District will appoint a citizens oversight committee, and conduct annual independent financial and performance audits to ensure that bond funds are spent only on the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or leasing of school facilities and for no other purposes.

Approval of Measure "T" will have no effect on existing law but will allow for the issuance and sale of bonds in accordance with the terms of existing law and Measure "T".

A "YES" VOTE MEANS the District will be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.

A "NO" VOTE MEANS the District <u>will not</u> be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.



RIGHTS

YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS:



The right to vote if you are a registered voter. You are eligible to vote if you are:

- a U.S. citizen living in California
- at least 18 years old
- registered where you currently live
- not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony
- not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court



The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list. You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.



The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.



The right to cast a secret ballot without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.



The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake, if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:

Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot,

Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place, or

Vote using a provisional ballot.



The right to get help casting your ballot from anyone you choose, except from your

employer or union representative.



The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place in California.



The right to get election materials in a language other than English if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.



The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.



The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.
