

Election Day is just around the corner on November 5, 2024! Your County Voter Information Guide is here, providing essential details for voting, including instructions on marking your ballot, candidate information, a sample ballot, and other important election details to review before you vote. Tip: You can mark your sample ballot and bring it with you to any Vote Center for easy reference.

Starting October 7, 2024, ballots will be mailed to all active registered voters. You can check your registration at <u>voterstatus.sos.ca.gov</u> or register at <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>.

Vote at any vote center. We have more days and more ways to cast your ballot!

- Returning Your Ballot: You may drop off your ballot at any secure ballot Drop-Off Location starting October 7, 2024, or mail your ballot via USPS (no postage needed).
- Receiving Your Ballot: Your ballot must be received by the Registrar of Voters by Election Day or postmarked on Election Day and received within seven days (November 12, 2024).
- Tracking Your Ballot: Register at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov.

Early Voting: Vote in person at the Registrar of Voters office starting October 7, 2024, (excluding holidays) 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Hours change on October 26 - 27, and November 2 - 3 to 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. For a list of locations and hours, visit voteinfo.net.

Election Day: All Vote Centers, including the Registrar of Voters office, will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

The voter registration deadline is October 21, 2024. For more information or questions, call us at (951) 486-7200.

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Previously known as partisan offices, voter-nominated offices include state legislative offices, United States congressional offices, and state constitutional offices.

In both the open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), a general election still must be held.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices may still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate may only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for United States President, county central committee, or local offices.

California law requires the following information to be printed in this guide.

Party-Nominated/Partisan Offices

Political parties may formally nominate candidates for party-nominated/partisan offices at the primary election. A nominated candidate will represent that party as its official candidate for the specific office at the general election and the ballot will reflect an official designation. The top vote-getter for each party at the primary election moves on to the general election. Parties also elect officers of county central committees at the primary election.

A voter can only vote in the primary election of the political party he or she has disclosed a preference for upon registering to vote. However, a political party may allow a person who has declined to disclose a party preference to vote in that party's primary election.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have his or her qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In the county voter information guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, if they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.





The following is the full proposition presented to the voters of School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 of the Beaumont Unified School District by the Beaumont Unified School District:

"To improve student safety/security systems, repair/replace deteriorating roofs, plumbing, electrical systems, and construct/upgrade/repair classrooms, labs, schools and career technology facilities to relieve overcrowding and support college/career readiness in science, technology, engineering, arts, math and skilled trades, shall Beaumont Unified School District's School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 measure authorizing \$148,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying \$28 per \$100,000 assessed value (\$10,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, be adopted, with citizen oversight, independent audits, all money locally controlled?"

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Trustees of the Beaumont Unified School District believes every student should have a safe and secure learning environment in order to help them achieve their highest potential. Beaumont is one of the fastest growing areas in California and there is a great need to build additional classrooms, labs and facilities to serve the families in our community. At the same time, the District's facilities are aging and in constant use. To that end, the District has completed a comprehensive Facilities Master Plan and has identified the most pressing needs in each of the District's schools to provide safe and modern classroom environments for all students. The Board has determined that facilities needs exist at all of its schools, and that additional school facilities will need to be constructed as the District enrollment increases as further described below.

The projects to be financed at each of the school facilities and locations listed above include the following and may be completed either through new construction or the reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of existing improvements and will include furnishings and equipment as needed for classrooms and other facilities:

- Safety and security improvements including security fencing, cameras, emergency communications, alarms, sprinklers, keyless entry, electronic locks and window protection.
- Classrooms, science labs, career technical education and skilled trade facilities, auditoriums, multipurpose rooms, cafeterias, kitchens, libraries, performing arts, sports facilities, restrooms and other facilities.
- Roofs, plumbing, lighting, electrical, sewer, water and fire alarm systems and building exteriors.
- Replacement of portable classroom space with new portable, modular or permanent classrooms for current and future program needs.
- Modernization of permanent school facilities.

- Upgrading or replacing aging school infrastructure.
- Site improvements including lunch and shade structures, playground areas and equipment, fields and hard courts, parking improvements, concrete walkway rehabilitation and replacement, and improvements to meet Americans for Disability Act (ADA) access requirements.
- Energy efficiency improvements including solar, heating, ventilation and air conditioning installation and replacement, and window replacement to improve classroom environments.
- Removal of hazardous materials such as asbestos and lead paint.
- Added space for school support programs, including dedicated offices, conference rooms, family resource centers and other support areas.
- Technology improvements and equipment for all classrooms, libraries, laboratories and other facilities including hardware and wireless systems, internet connectivity and software for instruction in math, science, engineering and technology.

Whenever specific items are included in the list above, they are presented to provide an example and are not intended to limit the generality of the broader description of authorized projects.

New School Facilities. The projects to be financed with bond proceeds also include the construction, site acquisition, equipping and furnishing of new schools, and the renovation and rehabilitation thereof, to provide facilities as enrollment increases. These projects include all elements of new schools including, but not limited to, classrooms, career technical education facilities, science and computer labs, auditoriums, gymnasiums, fields and stadiums, cafeterias, administration and support facilities, parking, playgrounds, hardscape, energy efficiency improvements, landscaping, furnishings and equipment.

Implementation of Construction and Bond Program. Listed projects will be completed only as needed and the above order in the listing of projects does not imply a particular prioritization among projects. Decisions regarding the scope, timing, prioritization or other facets of project implementation will be made solely by the Board of Trustees by subsequent action. Projects may be done in phases, based on Board of Trustees' priorities. Listed projects may be completed at any and all District schools, sites and education buildings where such projects are determined necessary by the Board of Trustees. Where terms such as "rehabilitation" and "replacement" are used in the foregoing Project List for the Bond Measure, the Board of Trustees shall determine the best method for accomplishing the project's objective. For any listed project involving renovation of all or a portion of a building, the District may proceed with new replacement construction instead (including any necessary demolition), if the District determines that replacement and new construction is more practical than renovation, considering the building's age, condition, expected remaining life, comparative cost, and other relevant factors.

Each project financed will include its share of architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program management, project or construction management, a contingency for unforeseen circumstances, offsite/utility connection costs, and interim housing. Projects also may include the payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility assessment reviews, environmental studies, construction documentation, plan check, inspection and permit fees and costs for temporary facilities, furnishings and equipment necessary in connection with construction activities.

The projects may include the acquisition of improvements on the project list that are financed by the District on an interim basis through temporary loans, leases, lease-leaseback, or lease-purchase arrangements.

The District intends to apply for State matching funds for all eligible projects to be financed. In the absence of such funding, the District may not be able to undertake some of the projects listed above. Approval of this proposition does not guarantee that the proposed projects that are the subject of this proposition will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by this proposition. The District's receipt of matching State funds will be subject to appropriation by the Legislature and approval of a statewide bond measure.

The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in this proposition in order that the voters and taxpayers in the District may be assured that their money will be spent only to address specific facilities needs of the District in compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section I (b)(3), of the State Constitution and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Education Code Sections 15264 and following.)

<u>Evaluation of Needs</u>. The Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing the project list contained in this ballot proposition.

<u>Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee</u>. The Board shall establish an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee pursuant to Education Code Section 15278 and following to ensure bond proceeds are expended only on the projects listed in this ballot proposition. The committee shall be established within 60 days of the date when the results of the election appear in the minutes of the Board.

<u>Performance Audits</u>. The Board shall conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the projects listed in this ballot proposition.

<u>Financial Audits</u>. The Board shall conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the projects listed in this ballot proposition.

Special Bond Proceeds Account: Annual Report to Board. Upon approval of this proposition and the sale of any bonds approved, the Board shall take actions necessary to establish an account in which proceeds of the sale of bonds will be deposited which will be a Building Fund to be held by the Riverside County Treasurer, as required by the California Education Code. As long as any proceeds of the bonds remain unexpended, the Superintendent of the District shall cause a report to be filed with the Board annually stating (1) the amount of bond proceeds received and expended in that year, and (2) the status of any project funded or to be funded from bond proceeds. The report may relate to the calendar year, fiscal year, or other appropriate annual period as the Superintendent shall determine and may be incorporated in the annual budget, audit, or another appropriate routine report to the Board.

ADDITIONAL SPECIFICATIONS

<u>Terms of the Bonds</u>. The bonds may be issued and sold in several series in accordance with the financing plan determined by the Board of Trustees. Bonds may be issued pursuant to the Education Code or the Government Code at the discretion of the Board of Trustees with final maturity dates and at interest rates not exceeding the legal limits set forth therein.

TAX RATE STATEMENT

SCHOOL FACILITIES IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1 OF THE BEAUMONT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS MEASURE E

An election will be held in School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 of the Beaumont Unified School District (the "SFID") on November 5, 2024 for the purpose of submitting to the electors of the SFID the question of incurring bonded indebtedness of the SFID in the principal amount of \$148,000,000. If such bonds are authorized and sold, the principal thereof and interest thereon will be payable from the proceeds of taxes levied on the taxable property in the SFID. The following information regarding tax rates is given in compliance with Section 9401 of the California Elections Code. This information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the SFID and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the assessed valuations of taxable property in the SFID, and assuming the entire debt service on the bonds will be paid through property taxation:

- 1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction or other demonstrable factors is \$28 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed. It is estimated that the final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is fiscal year 2054-55.
- 2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue, and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction or other demonstrable factors, is \$28 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed for fiscal years 2025-26 through and including 2054-55.
- 3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$303,122,478.

Attention of voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only. The actual timing of sales of the bonds and the amount to be sold at any time will be governed by the needs of the Beaumont Unified School District and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold, which will not exceed the maximum permitted by law, will depend upon the bond market at the time of sale. The actual assessed valuations in future years will depend upon the value of property within the SFID as determined in the assessment and the equalization process. Assessed valuation is not the same as market price of real property. Therefore, the actual tax rates and the years in which those tax rates will be applicable may vary from those presently estimated and stated above.

Voters should note that estimated tax rates are based on the ASSESSED VALUE of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls, <u>not</u> on the property's market value. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE "E"

State law authorizes school districts to sell bonds to finance improvements of student safety/security; build new classrooms/schools to relieve overcrowding; fix roofs and plumbing/electrical/ventilation systems; and repair/upgrade classrooms, science labs, and school facilities that support instruction in science, technology, engineering, arts, math, and skilled trades. Monies generated by the sale of such bonds may only be spent for these specified purposes. Bond proceeds cannot be expended to finance teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses.

The Beaumont Unified School District ("District") has called for an election within School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 of the District, on the question of whether bonds should be issued and sold by the District. Such bonds can only be issued and sold if at least 55% of the persons who actually vote approve Measure "E." The bonds would be repaid through an increase in property taxes based upon the assessed value of taxable property in the District in each year of repayment. The Tax Rate Statement, which appears following the full text of Measure "E" in this voter information pamphlet, reflects the District's current best estimate of the property tax rate increases that will be required to service the bonds at various points during the life of the bonds. At the time of issuance, the projected annual tax to be levied to meet debt service requirements for the proposed bonds is 2.8¢ per \$100 (or \$28 per \$100,000) of assessed value.

If Measure "E" is approved, bonds may be issued in series and must be repaid within a maximum statutory term of twenty-five (25) years. The maximum interest rate chargeable on the bonds is regulated by state law. The actual interest rates at which the bonds are sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale.

The District proposes to issue and sell bonds in an aggregate principal amount of one hundred forty-eight million dollars (\$148,000,000). Money raised by the sale of the bonds must be used exclusively to finance the list of projects described in the full text of Measure "E," which is included in this voter information pamphlet ("Bond Project List"). When developing the Bond Project List, the District was required by state law to evaluate safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs. Inclusion of a particular project on the Bond Project List, however, is not a guarantee that the project will actually be funded or completed.

If Measure "E" is approved and the bonds are sold, the District will appoint a citizens oversight committee, and conduct annual independent financial and performance audits to ensure that bond funds are spent only on the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or leasing of school facilities and for no other purposes.

Approval of Measure "E" will have no effect on existing law but will allow for the issuance and sale of bonds in accordance with the terms of existing law and Measure "E".

A "YES" VOTE MEANS the District <u>will</u> be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.

A "NO" VOTE MEANS the District <u>will not</u> be authorized to issue and sell the Bonds.



RIGHTS

YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS:



The right to vote if you are a registered voter. You are eligible to vote if you are:

- a U.S. citizen living in California
- at least 18 years old
- registered where you currently live
- not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony
- not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court



The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list. You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.



The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.



The right to cast a secret ballot without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.



The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake, if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:

Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot,

Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place, or

Vote using a provisional ballot.



The right to get help casting your ballot from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.



The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place in California.



The right to get election materials in a language other than English if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.



The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.



The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.

WARNING: ELECTIONEERING IS PROHIBITED!

VIOLATIONS CAN LEAD TO FINES AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHERE:

 Within the immediate vicinity of a person in line to cast their ballot or within 100 feet of the entrance of a polling place, curbside voting or drop box the following activities are prohibited.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- DO NOT ask a person to vote for or against any candidate or ballot measure.
- **DO NOT** display a candidate's name, image, or logo.
- DO NOT block access to or loiter near any ballot drop boxes.
- DO NOT provide any material or audible information for or against any candidate or ballot measure near any polling place, vote center, or ballot drop box.
- DO NOT circulate any petitions, including for initiatives, referenda, recall, or candidate nominations.
- **DO NOT** distribute, display, or wear any clothing (hats, shirts, signs, buttons, stickers) that include a candidate's name, image, logo, and/or support or oppose any candidate or ballot measure.
- **DO NOT** display information or speak to a voter about the voter's eligibility to vote.

The electioneering prohibitions summarized above are set forth in Article 7 of Chapter 4 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.

Voting Rights Restored for Persons with a Prior Felony Conviction

You can register and vote if you are:

- A U.S. citizen and a resident of California
- 18 years old or older on Election Day
- Not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- Not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony

If you meet these requirements, you can vote even if you:

- Have a misdemeanor conviction (a misdemeanor will never prevent you from voting)
- Are on parole supervision or probation
- Are on post-release community supervision (PRCS)

WARNING: CORRUPTING THE VOTING PROCESS IS PROHIBITED!

VIOLATIONS SUBJECT TO FINE AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- **DO NOT** commit or attempt to commit election fraud.
- **DO NOT** provide any sort of compensation or bribery to, in any fashion or by any means induce or attempt to induce, a person to vote or refrain from voting.
- **DO NOT** illegally vote.
- **DO NOT** attempt to vote or aid another to vote when not entitled to vote.
- **DO NOT** engage in electioneering; photograph or record a voter entering or exiting a polling place; or obstruct ingress, egress, or parking.
- DO NOT challenge a person's right to vote or prevent voters from voting; delay the process of
 voting; or fraudulently advise any person that he or she is not eligible to vote or is not registered to
 vote.
- DO NOT attempt to ascertain how a voter voted their ballot.
- DO NOT possess or arrange for someone to possess a firearm in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- **DO NOT** appear or arrange for someone to appear in the uniform of a peace officer, guard, or security personnel in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with any component of a voting system.
- **DO NOT** forge, counterfeit, or tamper with the returns of an election.
- DO NOT alter the returns of an election.
- DO NOT tamper with, destroy, or alter any polling list, official ballot, or ballot container.
- DO NOT display any unofficial ballot collection container that may deceive a voter into believing it is an official collection box.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with copy of the results of votes cast.
- **DO NOT** coerce or deceive a person who cannot read or an elder into voting for or against a candidate or measure contrary to their intent.
- DO NOT act as an election officer when you are not one.

EMPLOYERS cannot require or ask their employee to bring their vote-by-mail ballot to work or ask their employee to vote their ballot at work. At the time of payment of salary or wages, employers cannot enclose materials that attempt to influence the political opinions or actions of their employee.

PRECINCT BOARD MEMBERS cannot attempt to determine how a voter voted their ballot or, if that information is discovered, disclose how a voter voted their ballot.

The prohibitions on activity related to corruption of the voting process summarized above are set forth in Chapter 6 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.
