Dear Voter:

November 6, 2018 is Election Day. This County Voter Information Guide provides ballot marking instructions, polling place location, candidate information, and other important election details that you should review before you vote. You may mark your selections on your Sample Ballot and take it with you to the polls for easy reference.

You have several options for voting:

Vote-by-Mail – Voting by mail is convenient and easy. You will find an application to receive a Vote-by-Mail ballot on the back cover of this guide. The deadline to request a Vote-by-Mail ballot is October 30. You have several options for returning your ballot:

- Mail your ballot in time to reach the Registrar of Voters Office by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, or be postmarked
 on or before Election Day and received no later than three days after Election Day to be counted.
- Return your ballot in person to the Registrar of Voters Office during regular business hours and until close of
 polls on Election Day. For your convenience the Registrar's office has a secure locked drop box at its entry
 for ballot drop off 24 hours a day.
- Deposit your ballot in one of the secure drop-off boxes available at designated City Clerks' Offices from October 9 through November 5. Please visit our website to view a map of ballot drop-off locations.
- Take your ballot to any polling place, vote center, or ballot drop-off location within the state no later than the close of the polls on Election Day.
- You may confirm that the Registrar of Voters Office has received your returned Vote-by-Mail ballot on our website at <u>www.voteinfo.net</u>.
- Vote First, Count First! Vote-by-Mail ballots received before Election Day are counted first. Return your ballot as soon as possible to ensure that it is included in the first Election Night results!

Early Voting – Vote at the Registrar of Voters Office beginning October 9 through November 5 (excluding Holidays), Monday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; Saturday, October 27 and November 3, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; and Election Day, November 6, from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Early voting will also be available at participating malls in Riverside County on October 26 through October 28. Please visit our website at www.voteinfo.net for additional early voting information.

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Previously known as partisan offices, voter-nominated offices are state legislative offices, U.S. congressional offices, and state constitutional offices.

In both the open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes — regardless of party preference — move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), a general election still must be held.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for U.S. President, county central committee, or local offices.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices can still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate can only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

Superintendent of Public Instruction is a nonpartisan office. If a candidate for Superintendent of Public Instruction were to receive a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent +1) at the primary election, then that candidate would be elected, and no general election would be held. Additional information on nonpartisan offices can be found below.

California law requires the following information to be printed in this guide.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have his or her qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In this county voter information guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, if they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election, unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.

HOW TO MARK YOUR PAPER BALLOT

Please refer to the following instructions on how to properly complete your Official Ballot:

- ➤ Connect the head and tail of the arrow that points to your choice like the example provided.
- Check both front and back of ballot for voting contests.
- Use a black ball point pen. Do not use felt tip, red or gel ink.
- One line connecting the arrow is preferred.
- > Vote for no more than the number of votes allowed in each contest (e.g. vote for one, vote for no more than two, etc.).
- ➤ Please keep the Vote-by-Mail ballot folded the same way as you received it.

MEASURE "T" - CITY OF MURRIETA

ORDINANCE NO. ____-18

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MURRIETA, CALIFORNIA IMPOSING A TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF TAX AND FEE ADMINISTRATION AND ADDING CHAPTER 3.22, TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX, TO THE MURRIETA MUNICIPAL CODE

WHEREAS, the City of Murrieta ("City") has grown to become the largest city in Southern Riverside County with approximately 115,000 residents; and WHEREAS, funding for public safety services like police, fire, 9-1-1 emergency response and other essential City services has not expanded at the same rate; and

WHEREAS, over the last twenty-seven years, despite proactive efforts by the City such as reducing staff and streamlining city services to maintain the level of service our growing community has come to expect, the City faces a structural deficit of several million dollars in the coming fiscal years and, in addition, local streets, sidewalks and community facilities require ongoing maintenance that is beyond currently available resources; and

WHEREAS, in order to address these issues as soon as possible, the City Council desires to enact a one-cent transactions and use tax ordinance (the "Ordinance") with approval of the voters at the statewide general election on November 6, 2018; and

WHEREAS, if enacted, the Ordinance would provide a local revenue source and would increase the General Fund to provide services including, but not limited to, police services such as neighborhood police patrols and crime prevention programs to help prevent gang activity and drug-related crimes; improved fire protection and paramedic services and reduced response times to 911 emergencies; repairing potholes, local streets, public buildings and keeping public areas clean, well-maintained and free of graffiti; and

WHEREAS, the Ordinance will give the City local control over funds for local needs and no funds from this measure can be taken by the State; and

WHEREAS, Section 7285.9 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code authorizes any city to levy, increase or extend a transactions and use tax for general purposes at a rate of 0.125 percent, or a multiple thereof, subject to approval by a two-third vote of all members of the City Council and by a majority of the qualified voters of the City voting in an election on the issue; and

WHEREAS, if approved, the Ordinance would impose a tax on retail transactions involving sale and use of personal property. The tax rate would be one percent (1%) of the sales price of the property. The tax revenue would be collected by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration and remitted to the City.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VOTERS OF the City of Murrieta, California, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 3.22 "Transactions and Use Tax" shall be added to the Murrieta Municipal Code and shall read as follows:

Section 3.22.010 <u>TITLE</u>. This ordinance shall be known as the City of Murrieta Transactions and Use Tax Ordinance. The City of Murrieta hereinafter shall be called "City." This ordinance shall be applicable in the incorporated territory of the City.

Section 3.22.020 <u>OPERATIVE DATE.</u> "Operative Date" means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after the adoption of this ordinance, the date of such adoption being as set forth below.

Section 3.22.030 <u>PURPOSE</u>. This ordinance is adopted to achieve the following, among other purposes, and directs that the provisions hereof be interpreted in order to accomplish those purposes:

- A. To impose a retail transactions and use tax in accordance with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code and Section 7285.9 of Part 1.7 of Division 2 which authorizes the City to adopt this tax ordinance which shall be operative if a majority of the electors voting on the measure vote to approve the imposition of the tax at an election called for that purpose.
- B. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the State of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- C. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that imposes a tax and provides a measure therefore that can be administered and collected by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and requires the least possible deviation from, the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes.
- D. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that can be administered in a manner that will be, to the greatest degree possible, consistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimize the cost of collecting the transactions and use taxes, and at the same time, minimize the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3.22.040 <u>CONTRACT WITH STATE</u>. Prior to the operative date, the City shall contract with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this transactions and use tax ordinance; provided, that if the City shall not have contracted with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration prior to the operative date, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the operative date shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter following the execution of such a contract.

Section 3.22.050 TRANSACTIONS TAX RATE. For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail, a tax is hereby imposed upon all retailers in the incorporated territory of the City at the rate of 1% of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in said territory on and after the operative date of this ordinance.

Section 3.22.060 <u>PLACE OF SALE</u>. For the purposes of this ordinance, all retails ales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the State or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the State Board of Equalization.

Section 3.22.070 <u>USE TAX RATE</u>. An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in the City of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the operative date of this ordinance for storage, use or other consumption in said territory at the rate of 1% of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

Section 3.22.080 <u>ADOPTION OF PROVISIONS OF STATE LAW.</u> Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the provisions of Part 1 (commencing with Section 6001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are hereby adopted and made a part of this ordinance as though fully set forth herein.

Section 3.22.090. <u>LIMITATIONS ON ADOPTION OF STATE LAW AND COLLECTION OF USE TAXES.</u> In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

- A. Wherever the State of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of this City shall be substituted therefor. However, the substitution shall not be made when:
- 1. The word "State" is used as a part of the title of the State Controller, State Treasurer, State Treasury, or the Constitution of the State of California:
- 2. The result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against this City or any agency, officer, or employee thereof rather than by or against the State Board of Equalization, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this Ordinance.
- 3. In those sections, including, but not necessarily limited to sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the State of California, where the result of the substitution would be to:
- a. Provide an exemption from this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use or other consumption remain subject to tax by the State under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, or;
- b. Impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not be subject to tax by the state under the said provision of that code.
 - 4. In Sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797 or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- B. The word "City" shall be substituted for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in Section 6203 and in the definition of that phrase in Section 6203.
- Section 3.22.100 <u>PERMIT NOT REQUIRED.</u> If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under Section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional transactor's permit shall not be required by this ordinance.

Section 3.22.110 EXEMPTIONS AND EXCLUSIONS.

- A. There shall be excluded from the measure of the transactions tax and the use tax the amount of any sales tax or use tax imposed by the State of California or by any city, city and county, or county pursuant to the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law or the amount of any state-administered transactions or use tax.
 - B. There are exempted from the computation of the amount of transactions tax the gross receipts from:
- 1. Sales of tangible personal property, other than fuel or petroleum products, to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the county in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government.
- 2. Sales of property to be used outside the City which is shipped to a point outside the City, pursuant to the contract of sale, by delivery to such point by the retailer or his agent, or by delivery by the retailer to a carrier for shipment to a consignee at such point. For the purposes of this paragraph, delivery to a point outside the City shall be satisfied.
- a. With respect to vehicles (other than commercial vehicles) subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, and undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code by registration to an out-of-City address and by a declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, stating that such address is, in fact, his or her principal place of residence; and
- b. With respect to commercial vehicles, by registration to a place of business out-of-City and declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, that the vehicle will be operated from that address.
- 3. The sale of tangible personal property if the seller is obligated to furnish the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 4. A lease of tangible personal property which is a continuing sale of such property, for any period of time for which the lessor is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by the lease prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, the sale or lease of tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- C. There are exempted from the use tax imposed by this ordinance, the storage, use or other consumption in this City of tangible personal property:
- 1. The gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to a transactions tax under any state-administered transactions and use tax ordinance.
- 2. Other than fuel or petroleum products purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government. This exemption is in addition to the exemptions

provided in Sections. 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

- 3. If the purchaser is obligated to purchase the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 4. If the possession of, or the exercise of any right or power over, the tangible personal property arises under a lease which is a continuing purchase of such property for any period of time for which the lessee is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by a lease prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, storage, use, or other consumption, or possession of, or exercise of any right or power over, tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- 6. Except as provided in subparagraph (7), a retailer engaged in business in the City shall not be required to collect use tax from the purchaser of tangible personal property, unless the retailer ships or delivers the property into the City or participates within the City in making the sale of the property, including, but not limited to, soliciting or receiving the order, either directly or indirectly, at a place of business of the retailer in the City or through any representative, agent, canvasser, solicitor, subsidiary, or person in the City under the authority of the retailer.
- 7. "A retailer engaged in business in the City" shall also include any retailer of any of the following: vehicles subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, or undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code. That retailer shall be required to collect use tax from any purchaser who registers or licenses the vehicle, vessel, or aircraft at an address in the City.
- D. Any person subject to use tax under this ordinance may credit against that tax any transactions tax or reimbursement for transactions tax paid to a district imposing, or retailer liable for a transactions tax pursuant to Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code with respect to the sale to the person of the property the storage, use or other consumption of which is subject to the use tax.
- Section 3.22.112 <u>AMENDMENTS.</u> All amendments subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance to Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code relating to sales and use taxes and which are not inconsistent with Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and all amendments to Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, shall automatically become a part of this ordinance, provided however, that no such amendment shall operate so as to affect the rate of tax imposed by this ordinance.
- Section 3.22.113 <u>CITIZENS OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.</u> Prior to the operative date, the City Council shall (a) adopt a resolution establishing the composition of a committee of no more than three (3) members of the Community to review and biennially report on the revenue and expenditure of the funds adopted by this ordinance, (b) define the scope of the committee's responsibilities, and (c) appoint at least a quorum of the members of the committee. The committee's reports shall be presented to the Council and made available to the public.
- Section 3.22.114. <u>ENJOINING COLLECTION FORBIDDEN.</u> No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action or proceeding in any court against the State or the City, or against any officer of the State or the City, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this ordinance, or Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.
- Section 3.22.115 <u>SEVERABILITY.</u> If any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.
- Section 3.22.116. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE.</u> This ordinance relates to the levying and collecting of the City transactions and use taxes and shall take effect immediately.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE "T"

Measure T is a transactions and use tax within the City of Murrieta that, if adopted, taxes retail sales at a rate of one percent (1%) of the retail sales price, i.e., one cent for an item costing one dollar. Measure T is estimated to generate approximately \$14 million of revenue annually to provide general city funding for, among other things, emergency services such as police, fire, and paramedics; street maintenance and improvements; parks and recreation; maintenance of public facilities, such as graffiti removal, etc. All revenues generated by Measure T would remain with the City, as opposed to going to the state, county, etc.

The current sales tax rate in Murrieta is 7.75%, of which the City receives 1%, with the balance going to state and county funds. Measure T would authorize an additional local one percent (1%) "transactions and use tax," resulting in a combined rate of eight and three-quarters percent (8.75%).

A transactions and use tax is collected in the same manner as a traditional sales tax with minor exceptions, and is subject to the same general exemptions as sales taxes. Like a traditional sales tax, the tax will be paid by anyone, including residents of Murrieta, who purchase goods at retail establishments within Murrieta. In addition, Murrieta residents will pay the tax when they purchase an automobile, boat or aircraft anywhere in California and register it to an address in Murrieta, subject to certain statutory use exemptions. Funds collected pursuant to Measure T would be deposited into the City's general fund and could be used for any purpose for which general fund revenues may be used.

Measure T requires oversight by a citizens committee. Reports by the citizens committee are public records available for inspection by any member of the public.

The Murrieta City Council approved Measure T at its meeting of July 17, 2018 and requested that Riverside County place Measure T on the ballot at the November 6, 2018 general election. A "Yes" vote is a vote in favor of the tax. A "No" vote is a vote against the tax. Measure T will be approved if it receives a simple majority of "Yes" votes.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE "T"

Vote Yes on Measure T to maintain our exceptional quality of life here in Murrieta.

The City of Murrieta is one of the safest cities in the entire nation thanks to our local Police and Fire Departments. Having local first responders mean police and firefighters are available when you need them most. Fast emergency response times for 911 calls are critical for saving lives.

However, Murrieta is facing a growing budget deficit, \$10 million less per year, due to State mandates and Sacramento money grabs threatening our safety and quality of life. The City has been fiscally responsible by laying off staff, deferring maintenance and reducing costs. Simply put, there is no more room to cut without impacting public safety and recreation programs, the library and other core services.

Measure T will help Murrieta maintain high quality public safety services, streets and local parks — which are essential to protecting strong local property values.

REBUTTAL TO ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE "T"

True North Research was hired by the City of Murrieta in August of 2017 to find out what a potential voter needed to hear to vote for this tax hike.

According to True North Research, it's almost as critical to emphasize "pot hole repair" as "public safety." "A clear system of accountability" in the ballot measure, like "requiring citizen oversight" is also important. Evidently, some voters have a sense of distrust and by including accountability in the tax hike measure, it offers re-assurance to that skeptical voter.

True North Research has a reputation of success, just follow the playbook. In addition to the ballot measure itself, several of the statements included in the Argument in Favor of Measure T and signed by our City leaders were taken verbatim from the True North Research script. Cut and paste!

In January of 2018, Dr. Timothy McClarney from True North Research wrote, "The City is facing a structural deficit that is projected to reach nearly \$3 million per year in Fiscal Year 2018-2019." ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE "T"

The economy has been *ROARING* but our City claims it can't pay its future bills to sustain services? Our City claims it has to double the City's sales tax rate on Murrieta families to raise the \$14 million in new tax money. Our City claims that a one percent tax hike in sales tax equals that \$14 million shortfall. **Not True**

On February 20, 2018, our City Council was informed that the sales tax revenue jumped by almost 17% and would total **\$17 million dollars in FY 2017/2018**.

Previous years' revenue numbers also appear robust:

- "Sales Tax revenues increased 5.4% and program revenues increased 8.5% from the previous year." CAFR FY 2016/2017
- "Sales Tax has surpassed pre-recession levels...General Fund revenue ended up 8.3% higher than previous year." CAFR F/Y 2015/2016
- "General Fund revenue ended up 8.2% higher than previous year." CAFR F/Y 2014/2015

During the *July 24, 2018 State of the City*, Murrieta declared, "The City has observed a steady recovery since the 2007 Recession!" "The future of Murrieta is going to be absolutely amazing to watch!" said our Mayor Jonathan Ingram.

There was no mention of a pending budget crisis.

In August of 2017, our City spent \$26,550 with True North Research to survey a sampling of 400 Murrieta voters. The survey was designed to find out what a potential voter needed to hear to vote for a tax hike. In March of 2018, our City Council agreed to contract with a San Francisco consultant for \$60,000 to market this ballot initiative based on the results of that survey data.

This tax scam is based on that *taxpayer-funded* \$86,550 scheme!

Does our City have a "structural budget deficit"? How much is our "structural budget deficit"? Murrieta families deserve to know the truth. Vote NO.

Conditional Voter Registration

Did you forget to register? No problem! Did you know that during the period of 14 days prior to Election Day through and including Election Day, you can go to the office of the Riverside County Registrar of Voters to conditionally register to vote and vote? This process is called Conditional Voter Registration (CVR). Here's how it works:

- 1. Visit the Registrar of Voters office located at 2724 Gateway Drive, Riverside, CA 92507
- 2. Complete a voter registration card or register online at RegisterToVote.ca.gov
- 3. Vote your CVR provisional ballot. CVR ballots will only be issued at the office of the Registrar of Voters.

Once the county elections official processes the affidavit of registration, determines that you're eligible to register, and validates your information, the registration becomes permanent and your CVR provisional ballot will be counted.

California Motor Voter

The California Motor Voter program is making registering to vote at the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) more convenient and secure. All eligible individuals completing driver license or ID card or change of address transactions at the DMV will be registered to vote with the California Secretary of State unless they "opt out" of automatic voter registration.

The California Motor Voter program applies to Californians who are 18 years or older and meet the following criteria:

- A United States citizen and a resident of California.
- Not currently in state or federal prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony.
- Not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court.

Note: Voter pre-registration is available for those 16 and 17 years of age. Their voter registration will become active automatically when they turn 18.

Before visiting a DMV field office, we recommend making an appointment. Visit https://www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/dmv/detail/portal/foa/welcome to get started. You can also use DMV online services (https://www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/dmv/dmv/onlinesvcs) to renew your driver license or ID card or change your address.

If you indicate you're eligible to vote, once you complete your driver license or state ID renewal form transaction online, by mail or in person at the DMV, your voter information is then transmitted securely and electronically to the California Secretary of State.

Please note that drivers with an AB 60 driver's license are not eligible to participate in the California Motor Voter program and are not eligible to vote.

VOTER BILL OF RIGHTS

YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS:



The right to vote if you are a registered voter. You are eligible to vote if you are:

- a U.S. citizen living in California
- at least 18 years old
- registered where you currently live
- not currently in state or federal prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony
- not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court



The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list. You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.



The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.



The right to cast a secret ballot without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.



The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake, if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:

Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot.

Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an elections office or at your polling place, or

Vote using a provisional ballot.



The right to get help casting your ballot from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.



The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place in California.



The right to get election materials in a language other than English if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.




The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.



The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.
